The Diptera of Lancashire and Cheshire

L. N. KIDD

The present list covers Diptera of the families Tipulidae to Syrphidae and is the second supplement to *The Diptera of Lancashire and Cheshire—Part* 1 by L. N. Kidd and A. Brindle, published by the Lancashire and Cheshire Fauna Committee in 1959. The first supplement appeared in the 34th Report (1964) and also separately as Publication No. 46 of the Committee. Some 14 species belonging to the above families are here added to the faunal area, 19 more to either Lancashire or Cheshire, and a further 7 are recorded for one of the two Lancashire vice-counties. Owing to previous misidentifications three species have been deleted from the area list.

As in the case of Kidd and Brindle, 1959, v.c. 60 (Lancashire north of the Ribble) has been taken to include the Arnside area and the district north of the Kent estuary, included within the political boundaries of Lancashire but now placed in v.c. 69. Also in keeping with the above publication, the Goyt Valley has been included with the Cheshire records although the whole of the valley is now in Derbyshire.

STRATIOMYIDAE

ASILIDAE

Rhadiurgus variabilis (Zett.) Skidmore (1966) has pointed out that this species, which is an insect of pine forests in the

EMPIDIDAE

- Tachydromia agilis Mg. (Platypalpus agilis) A female of this common species was taken in Holden Clough (v.c. 59) on 13-7-1969. This is apparently a late date for the species as Collin (1961, p.201) gives the latest record as the end of June.

According to Collin (1961, p.750) this species has been seldom found in Britain, but is recorded from Hereford, Yorkshire and on the summit of the Aviemore-Braemar pass in Scotland. It is also known from Blaze Moss, Lancs. (Kidd and Brindle, 1959).

The Grasshoppers, Earwigs and Cockroaches of Lancashire and Cheshire

A. BRINDLE

These orders, the Orthoptera, Dermaptera, and Blattodea, have not been systematically collected in the two counties, and the present records are mainly due to incidental collecting. It is hoped to survey the orders more thoroughly in the future, and there are a few additional species which may occur. These orders, however, are characteristic of dryer and warmer climates, and the majority of the British species are restricted to the southern counties, so that any future additions to the list are likely to be few. The wetter western counties of England are also less attractive than the drier eastern counties, and some species extend further north in England along the eastern part than they do along the western side of the country. Both Conocephalus dorsalis (Latreille) and Metrioptera roeselii (Hagenbach) are recorded from Spurn, East Yorkshire, which lies at about the same latitude as the Ribble estuary, but the former extends no further north in western England than Merionethshire on the mainland, whilst the latter is not recorded from any part of western England. Future collecting in Lancashire and Cheshire, therefore, will probably be most useful in extending the list of localities for the known species.

The recent excellent book on the Orthoptera, Phasmida, and Blattodea of the British Isles by Ragge (1965) should give an impetus to the sudy of these orders, since it provides a very
